The Washington Post (cont)

1991 – 2008

Executive Editor

- Directed newsroom staff of as many as 900 people with annual budget exceeding \$100 million. Staff awarded 25 Pulitzer Prizes, including three Pulitzer Gold Medals for Public Service, during my 17 years as executive editor.

1984 – 1991

Managing Editor

- Managed newsroom day-to-day under Executive Editor Ben Bradlee. Oversaw newspaper re-design and wide-ranging expansion of coverage.

1982 – 1984

National Editor

- Supervised coverage of politics, government and national affairs, including first of seven presidential and thirteen congressional elections during 26 years as national editor, managing editor and executive editor.

1979 – 1982

London correspondent

- Covered Great Britain, Ireland, Scandinavia and European Community, including government of Margaret Thatcher in Britain, Rhodesian peace conference in London that created Zimbabwe, IRA hunger strike in Northern Ireland, economic awakening in Ireland, anti-nuclear movement in Europe and formative years of European Community.

1974 – 1979

Assistant Managing Editor, Metro

- Directed local news coverage of Washington, D. C., Maryland and Virginia. Expanded staff, suburban coverage and investigative reporting.

1972 – 1974

Deputy Metro Editor

- Helped direct coverage of local news, including Watergate investigation. Edited coverage of Senate Watergate Committee hearings and then investigative reporting of Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein during final 18 months before resignation of President Richard Nixon.

1971 – 1972

Leave of absence on Alicia Patterson Fellowship

- Traveled across the United States, Europe and Israel researching urban development, including the New Towns movement. Produced monthly newsletters and material for later book, *Mortgage on America*.
